WALT THODE, INTERIM SAGE TICK EDITOR



As you may have heard, our long-time *Sage Tick* editor, Stuart Davis, resigned after the last issue. We are in the process of identifying a new editor. Stu, and his assistant for many years, Laura Lantz, worked hard in getting the newsletter to its present state of excellence. Stu was the editor from the beginning of 2010 until the issue prior to this one. During that time he was dealing with some serious health issues, so his dedication to the production of regular issues was challenging at times. We want to thank Stu and Laura for their long and fruitful service to the Region.

Having served my time as editor in the past, it's my intention to limit my involvement to this one issue while the process of selecting the next editor proceeds. For the first time in my twenty years as a member of the Silver Sage Region, we have received numerous offers to take the reins. In the past, it's always been selecting from a field of one, or, more often, twisting an arm or two to get the job filled. We have had to develop a selection process which, hopefully, will result in a highly qualified, motivated new editor for the issue that comes out in December.

It's interesting to look back at the evolution of newsletter publication, using the *Sage Tick* as an example. Somewhere in the Region's storage unit there is a box containing an archive of almost all of the *Sage Tick* issues from its beginning in 1967 to the present day. The very first ones were impressive because they were developed and printed at probably great expense on glossy paper at a top-of-the-line print shop. The club soon reverted to much more economical production methods, and for many years they were produced, without any

graphics except fairly crude line drawings, on a mimeograph machine. In the 1980s, editors were able to produce a good-looking newsletter by carefully pasting photos by hand into prepared text sheets. It was only in the late '80s and early '90s that desktop publishing software had advanced to the point where you could type words on a computer screen and drop photos and other objects right into the text flow. By the time I started my first editorial stint in 1997, the process was fairly straightforward and simple, but publishing still involved trips to the print shop to drop off the master and pick up the copies, printing and attaching mailing labels, sorting finished copies by zip code for the bulk mail facility, and delivering them to the facility. Now, once an issue is complete, we can simply send it electronically to the print shop along with a mailing list, and they take it from there. Today's editors don't know how good they have it! (There, does that sound enough like a cranky old former editor?)

I'd like to pay homage to the other previous editors of the *Sage Tick* for their service to the Region since 1967: Bruce Belcher, Wilke Myers, Rick Herriott, Dick Kersting, Marilyn Moore, Mary & Gary Doyles, John Burrows, John & Darcy Sawyer, Coleen Armitage, Judy Jones, Wally & Marion Overton, Dave Brydl, Bob & Vicki Pentecost, Karen Brydl, Beverly Dugger, Dan Coles, Kimberly Jobes, Cyrille de Brebisson, Hal McMillan, and Stuart Davis. Having served in this capacity, I know how much work they have done. Their contribution to the smooth functioning of the Region has been important and is much appreciated. �






SPOKANE PARADE REPORTS (VARIOUS ATTENDEES)

Liam Spencer: The 2017 Porsche Parade in



AUTOCROSS REPORT


The Silver Sage Autocross was held in early June this year. This is the event sponsored by Porsche of Boise that involves the use of SCCA autocross


