



#### **UTAH MOTORSPORTS CAMPUS D.E. EVENT**

Silver Sagers Robert Sturgeon, Sid Cannon, and I recently made the trip to Utah Motorsports Campus (UMC) near Tooele, Utah for the Intermountain Region's first Drivers' Education (DE) event of 2017.


The trip to UMC is an easy drive on interstate all the way and there are several good hotels and restaurants to choose from. I had heard good things about UMC and it is an excellent facility. The track is engaging, safe and in great condition. The paddock and other facilities are top notch.

This was Robert's first DE and Sid's third. As a PCA National Instructor, I've had the opportunity to drive several of the tracks along the West Coast but this was my first time to

UMC. Sid and

Robert shared driving a beautiful 1990 Porsche track prepped 964 Carrera 2 and my 1991 944 S2 hadn't been out to the track since last September.

It snowed in Tooele Friday night before the DE but by Saturday it was a crisp, clear morning. Upon arriving at the track, participants checked in and had their cars inspected. The Intermountain DE team knows how to run a safe, smooth and well-coordinated DE event. The day started out with a drivers' meeting that included a review of safety procedures, flags and driving techniques. Drivers are grouped according to experience into three different run groups. After the drivers' meeting, new



drivers paired up with their instructors for the day, who provide in-car instruction and guidance. The instructors are your personal coaches for the day and their role is to help new drivers get familiar with driving at speed, the capabilities of their car and the racetrack.

UMC has four different configurations that the track can be run. We were running the East Loop and over on the West loop, Ford was filming with professional drivers piloting six brand new Ford GTs as well as a vintage GT. Quite a sight!

After our first session, Robert, Sid, and I were starting to get the feel of the course. A couple of laps into the second session and I was tuned into the rhythm of the track and pushing a little harder. But my day was cut short as a rear



half shaft broke and I had to hang up my helmet for the rest of the day. Although equipment problems do happen occasionally, this was only the second time in 17 years I've had a day-ending mechanical problem. Too bad – it was really getting fun!

Sid and Robert ran all day and they said burned up a whole tank of gas and logged about 170 miles between them. This works out to about 10 MPG - not bad considering the gas pedal was to the floor most the time! Sid started running out of gas during his last session and was ready to pit but his instructor told

him to keep going and he drove another three laps and finally pitted. By the end of the day, there were big smiles all around!

UMC has two more PCA DE events this year, with the next on June 2-4. I'll be going and if there are other Silver Sagers going, we will set up a dinner on Friday night.

Another event to plan for this year is the Porsche Parade DE on July 16 offered by the inland NW Region in Spokane. This is great opportunity to meet other PCA'ers from around the country! Once more I grabbed my keys, and this time a jacket, and off I headed to the local Chevron. A quick top off and once more I was on the road.

Pulling into the parking lot, at what I thought was on the early side of time, was already a gathering of about 12 cars and friendly faces all enjoying each others company. I looped around once and found a parking spot a row away from the crowd. As soon as I jumped out of the car, I was greeted by a familiar face. Sid Cannon had come over to say hello. The previous weekend at the Coffee & Cars event, Sid had singled out my wife Lisa and me from the crowd and introduced himself, and his wife Vicki. We had a good chat at each stop, with Sid filling us both in on the local chapter, the people and cars, as well as some recommendations on various shops and restaurants.

My wife had just started her new job and was in SoCal for training, so I had planned on being a 5th wheel somewhere. More and more cars showed up, and the crowd got even larger. Some folks scurried over to Cafe Crane for breakfast before we set out. Once the hellos had been said, I went back to my car to set up my GoPro before departure. A quick drivers' meeting held by President John Sommerwerck instructed us to break into two groups of cars, with about 10 in each.

Being that my wife was out of town, I knew I could open the car up a little more without much objection, so I wanted to make sure I was a part of the first group. Everyone fired up their cars, and we slowly rolled out of the WinCo parking lot and down the highway. Already I was getting excited, as I've only had my 964 for about 3 months. Working from home full time now doesn't warrant the need to drive it every day, which has been a bit of a letdown. So as soon as the road cleared, I rolled on the throttle to hear that glorious air-cooled flat six growl. I can't begin to tell you guys how in love with this car I am. It replaced my 1986 944 Turbo (which was an absolute riot itself), but this car somehow takes it to a new level, while still being slower than the outgoing garage occupant.

We turned off the highway to take some local farm roads. The entire time spent enjoying the passing scenery, the gray Boxster and white Panamera behind me, and Sid and Vicki's 997 GT3 in front. I fidgeted around with the GoPro remote once in a while to make sure I was still recording. Out of the farm roads and back to the highway we went. And all I could do was smile as I ripped down the road, and watched one by one as each car re-entered the highway.

It was nice to see that John and the four or five cars that made it through before the parade had pulled over to wait for the rest of us. Once they had passed, we were back up to speed and on our way to the



Why should you care? If you like financial incentives, one reason is the "leg up" of \$300 to \$500 one-time cash that The Jesse Tree provides to low income families for rent assistance. This saves the taxpayers approximately \$3,500 to \$4,000 in providing one-time services per family. Another important reason: the children are allowed to stay safely in their homes and in their schools. The cash assistance and case management services provided by The Jesse Tree allow its clients to avoid the instability, stigma and physical danger that come with homelessness. Over the next few months, the charity committee and Mary Monroe, the SSPCA member who nominated The Jesse Tree, will be available to inform you of all The Jesse Tree does for our community. We will also be asking you to help us conduct a successful fundraising campaign as the year rolls to a close, especially with our November fund-raising auction.

One of our past charities, Book it Forward! Idaho, is going to put a "Little Library" in The Jesse Tree offices and keep it stocked. 



## SUN VALLEY TRIP IN SEPTEMBER by Stu Davis

#### TECH SESSION AT PORSCHE OF BOISE

On March 11, about 40 Silver Sagers came to the Lyle Pearson dealership's service bay for another of the region's series of technical sessions. These have been held on a variety of topics, and an enthusiastic group of members always attends.

This year several topics were covered. The first was a joint presentation focused on the long-term future of internal combustion engines, a topic that you would expect to interest most of our members. The first

presentation was given by Casey Mattoon from the Sierra Club, assisted by electric car enthusiast Reed Burkholder. Both are enthusiastic advocates of alternatives to internal combustion. Casey's presentation covered the characteristics of electric vehicles in particular, and the negative side effects of years of emissions and of the extraction of petroleum and other fuels used in internal combustion vehicles. Reed talked about his years of EV ownership and touched on his solar panel installation that provides the "juice" for his car.

The second presentation, by member Derek Parker, presented information about some emerging technological efforts that may improve



the performance of internal combustion engines and alleviate some of their deleterious effects. He also presented information about some of the long-term drawbacks that may result from a large increase in the number of electric vehicles, in terms of some of the toxic elements that result from their use, and the lack of worldwide resources needed in their manufacture.

After a break, Porsche of Boise Lead Technician Mike Bell discussed the Porsche CAN-Bus vehicle control architecture, along with member Paul Guggenbeuhl, who is a retired flight controls engineer for military combat aircraft. It was interesting to learn how similar the electronic architecture for a high-tech fighter jet is to the modern Porsche. We have always known that our cars can "fly on the road", and now we can see why.

Finally, Lyle Pearson sales personnel, including Jeff Woody and Shawn Ferguson provided an overview of some of the new features included in the latest Porsche infotainment systems.

Many thanks are due to Porsche of Boise, who provided coffee and refreshments in addition to the time of their personnel and the use of their service bay area for this session. Also, thanks go to Casey, Reed, and especially to Derek, who put this session together, as he has for the last several years. I'm looking forward to what he comes up with for next year's tech session.
