


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## **PRESIDENT'S PAGE**

## OCTOBER 2<sup>nd</sup>—C&P DRIVE

After several scheduling conflicts I finally got my chance to lead the club's monthly Saturday Coffee and Porsches drive. It ended up being on Oktoberfast weekend, so I was told that it better be good and that a member of the PCA National Executive Committee would attend so don't screw it up. We had over 40 cars pre-register for the drive and the forecast was for great weather so everything was looking good. I chose to head up to the mountains, of course, because that's where some of the best Porsche driving roads are. I decided to end the drive at Payette Brewing which seemed



like an Oktoberfast themed thing to do. Denis Dunlop and I did the requisite pre-drive during the week including a tasting of the beer at Payette and everything was indicating this would be a fun and scenic drive.

Knowing generally where I wanted to lead the group and its final destination, I next had to face into the two key drive planning challenges:


How do I plan the restroom stops out in the middle of nowhere?

What approach do I use to provide directions so we don't have cars getting lost?

Regarding restroom, I decided to stop at the Lucky Peak Viewpoint on the way out of town as opposed to attempting a stop in Idaho City. It would be much easier in a stop-and-go sense, had plenty of parking, and it avoided interference with the Idaho City Days event. After that it would be 60+ miles to a turn around and

emergency restroom stop at the Lowman ranger station. So far so good!

Now is when the two challenges overlapped, I needed to fill some time between leaving Porsche of Boise and the Lucky Peak Viewpoint. I decided to take a short tour in the desert to the southeast which would add the necessary time and allow people to process the coffee part of Coffee and Porsches. I charted what I thought was a straight forward route, with nearly all right hand turns or un-

obstructed left turns. Given that plan, I then decided to make a visual map based on a Google Maps images and some hand annotations. I knew once we got to the viewpoint everything would be easy since it was essentially and out and back drive, on a single highway, with no turns except the U-turn at the ranger station.

On the day of the event, we had close to 40 cars and we split the group into two with myself leading the first group and Denis leading the second group. After some socializing at Porsche of Boise (PoB) we held the driver's meeting where I described the plan, went over the map, and told everyone we would regroup at the Lucky Peak Viewpoint where there should be a good photo op. There were few to no questions, some people indicated that the Viewpoint would be their turnaround destination, but in general I was



feeling pretty good about the day. Off we went with our radios set, leads and sweepers in place, and help from the PoB staff to get out onto Cole Road in two clean groups. My group executed the plan with only a short pause or two along the way to ensure that everyone was caught up.

However, I realized something was amiss with the second group when we approached the park at the bottom of the Lucky Peak dam and I see John Sommerwerck's GT3 RS waiting at the side of the road. We pull into the Viewpoint parking area and waited to see how many of the second group were going to arrive and to find out what happened on my thoughtfully constructed plan. What I found was that the second group blew up on the back side of the airport prior to the traffic light where Gowen and Orchard roads coalesce. Some people made the correct right turn at the Gowen/Orchard light, some continued on and turned right at Pleasant Valley Road, some followed Gowen till they hit the

After looping through the ranger station, we regrouped in the South Fork Lodge parking lot. People were given the option to return via the Lowman to Banks Road, which many did, or retracing the more technical route over the Mores Creek

Trivia Contest..." which one is Frick and which one is Frack?



## TIRE TALK: THE TECHNICAL ASPECTS OF WINTER TIRES PORSCHE BOISE

Winter tires can deliver superior traction, as much as 25-50% more than all-season tires, which can be very important this time of year. If you use winter tires, it is important to use a matched set of four to maintain balanced and controlled handling. Below are some of the technical points about winter tires:

Winter tires are made with a greater percentage of natural rubber and silica, designed to remain softer as temperatures drop; this keeps the surface flexible and above the glass transition temperature at which a rubbery compound transitions to a more brittle, "glassy" state. These tires also have an open, deep tread with a high void ratio between rubber and the spaces in-between, as well as a specialized tread design (shoulder blocks) at the outside of the tire tread to increase contact and friction. Winter tires also have additional cuts (sipes) that are designed to maximize traction in slush and wetness. These cuts can actually fill with snow and allow snow crystals to grip onto other snow crystals, providing additional traction instead of slippage. Be sure to ask your Porsche Boise representative for more safety features and technical specifications of winter tires to make sure you are fully prepared for this winter.

## WINTER PORSCHE TIPS:

#### **PORSCHE BOISE**

#### HOW TO PROPERLY PREPARE AND STORE YOUR PORSCHE FOR THE WINTER

As the weather turns cold and the possibility of snow, sleet, ice, hail, and slippery roads becomes part of our planning for any trip (long or short) in the car, be sure to be prepared by checking these 10 items on your Porsche and always consult your Owner's Manual:

**1. Replace oil and dirty filters.** You may even consider a lower viscosity oil for the winter, especially in older vehicles. Drops in temperature cause increases in viscosity which can make your engine work harder, especially at start-up. With this being the case, it becomes even more important to have fresh filters and cleaner air running through your harder-working engine.

**2. Perform cooling system maintenance.** Your radiator should be drained and coolant replaced with one that has a lower freezing point.

**3.** Heater and defroster checks. Nobody wants to be stuck on a cold day with the heater not working properly; be sure to have this checked for optimal performance.

**4. Inspect lights and bulbs.** With daylight hours shorter, it is especially important to be safe with proper headlights, taillights, and turn signals. Be sure low beams and high beams work correctly and check to be sure taillights and fog lights are fully visible. For all lights, be sure dust, dirt, haze, or any foreign material is wiped away on a regular basis.

**5. Battery check.** During cold weather, your car's starter draws more power from the battery to get the engine running. Be sure your battery is healthy.

6. Check tire pressure and replace worn tires. Your vehicle's tires are the only point of contact you have with the road and as the road becomes wet or slippery this winter, it is important to have tires with enough tread to be safe. Be sure your tires are in good shape and consider switching to winter tires if you may be facing more extreme weather this winter. Also be sure to check each tire's pressure and consider the lower end of the recommended pressure range as this can help increase your tires' surface area and have an improved grip on the road.

**7. Brakes check.** Brakes are an item that endure wear and tear every time a vehicle is driven and brakes can wear unevenly. To ensure your own safety and the safety of other drives, be sure to have your brakes checked and have any brake maintenance done sooner than later.

8. Inspect belts and hoses. While it is true that today's belts and hoses are designed to last a long time, none are expected to last forever and cold temperatures can take an extra toll by causing splits and breaks in belt and hose material. Even the slightest tear or crack can quickly worsen so be prepared by having anything that even appears marginal or questionable replaced.

Garden City was the scene for May where we enjoyed the Powderhaus Brewery. The food truck was Big Fry




Boise and we kept them busy.


