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LOCAL CONNECTIONS

ARTICLE BY JULIO DEULOFEU AND DAN ANDERSON

One thing we have come to appreciate is the efforts club members take to keep air-cooled cars in the local community.

We were fortunate to play a role in a couple of recent transactions that started with Wade Nelson telling Julio about a 70's 911 Targa and Dan mentioning to Andrew King that he was looking for a 964 or 993 generation 911. Read on to discover the back stories on these local connections.



FINE THINGS COME WITH AGE

One of my many pleasant experiences of moving to Boise back in January of 2021 was to discover a large and vibrant

Porsche community. My first stop was to get rid of the California plates for the Macan and the 993 and then quickly join Silver Sage. Like many, my air-cooled love affair began with a 1967 VW 1500, it had all the typical upgrades, Porsche 356 wheels, Koni shocks and much more.

It became clear that owning a Porsche was the next logical step. One morning while having breakfast at our local café on Washington Blvd in Venice CA, I looked across the street and there it was, an Irish Green 1974 911 for sale. I think the name of the shop was Autohaus. Head studs had pulled out of the case, the owner (a doctor) was selling It as-is, he did not want to deal with it. Love at first sight, I turned it into a "s" spec car and kept it for many years.



As many of you will agree ... I should have never sold that car which then sadly ended my Porsche ownership for the next two decades. I had convinced myself that it was time to move to a more "adult" car, one that combined performance and adulthood, silly idea now in hindsight. I tried a MB 500SEC, then a BMW 733 but the desire to add a Porsche back into the mix was kept alive over the years.

By 2001 I was again ready to find another Porsche, the 996's had recently been introduced but I wanted no part of a water-cooled Porsche, I was a die-hard air-cooled only zealot so I went looking for a 993. Took a few weeks but finally narrowed it down to two cars; one was a base 993 referral from a friend of a friend with very low miles, and the other car was a black 993 Turbo. If I recall correctly, the price difference was only around \$15,000. I did not really want black, and felt that the turbo would be more maintenance, so I chose the base 993 ... big mistake!!!

Twenty-one years of 993 ownership went fast with lots of fun drives and events. Rob from S-Car-Go took care of the 993 from day one. When the valve guides had to be replaced, which happens like clockwork at 36,000 miles on every 993, we decided to have some fun. Rob ported and polished the heads and intake manifold, added a RSR cam, light RS lightweight single-mass flywheel and clutch. Rob is still not happy with me for selling the car, it was his project as much as mine.

Over the years I wanted to acquire a fun light weight simpler car to autocross, or just have fun with. Once in Boise and with more free time, that desire only grew. One of my first and highly valued local connections in Boise was Wade, the moment I met him I knew he was the real deal; he knows air-cooled cars. As we got to know each other I told him that I was in the market for a 70's car, maybe a 914, something that was simple and fun to drive.

A few weeks went by and while visiting his shop he tells me about a local Gemini Blue 911 Targa that is for sale. The moment I saw the car I knew that I wanted it particularly since it was a local, one owner, car. Technically it was not one owner since it had been handed down from father to son, but it was in the same family and to me it qualified as one owner. The car was originally purchased the car new at Johnson-Bozzani in Phoenix and years later after much insistence from the owner's son Patrick, he gave him the car and it moved to Boise.

The car had full documentation from the date of purchase and was original in every way. The only thing missing were the door pockets which I quickly replaced. After a quick visit to Sano Blast, Chris dry ice blasted the battery compartment, removed some of the battery acid leaks, no rust to be found, there, or in any other part of the car. Perfect in every way.



I was quite fortunate that I ended up with that car as several members have told me that they should have bought that car. I think the car was there waiting for me and I'm glad that we found each other. Friends ask me if I miss the 993, sometimes, yes, but I'm really enjoying the simplicity of the 911T, maybe it reminds me of how much fun the 70's were. Whatever it is, I am happy that we are together. I think the 993 is the most beautiful and fun car that Porsche has ever made. I am very happy I made a local connection when I sold it and I am pretty sure that Dan will take me for a ride if I ask nicely.



SEEKING THE ILLUSIVE 964 OR 993

I have been interested in air-cooled VWs and Porsches my whole life and have owned numerous VWs and Porsches since the

early seventies. As a young person, I learned to mechanic on air-cooled engines and built and raced several hot-rodded VWs. In the 1970s, I owned two Porsche 356s. Unfortunately, one was totaled in a collision and the other failed me on the Loveland Pass. As a college student, without the means to repair the engine, I reluctantly sold the car for \$3,000 in 1980, sadly ending my Porsche ownership for the next two and a half decades.

I wanted to get back in the game and started looking around for another 356. They had become quite valuable during my twenty-year hiatus and out of my financial reach. In 2006 I found a local 912E at a good price and decided that would be my reintroduction to Porsche ownership.

The 912E became a daily driver and it was both sons commuter. I drove it to and from work for a while until the engine dropped a valve seat in 2008. My plan was to just replace the head and get it back on the road. With the engine out, one thing led to the other and I ended up building a Jake Raby designed engine. The engine rebuild was followed by a full restoration starting in 2009, lasting through 2012 when daily driving resumed.

The 912E still is my fair-weather driver and is used for Silver Sage events including autocrosses.

Being a VW air-cooled fan, I often thought about buying a bus. They have a cult following and are popular among VW enthusiast's but scarce. I had spotted a bus sitting in a driveway in Elko Nevada that looked to be inoperable but in decent condition. The owner (a hippie sort) was not interested in selling as she was saving it for her son. For ten years, I made annual visits to the lady with the same response until one day in 2011, the lady called and said her son was not interested in the bus and it was mine if I still wanted it. I did and bought the 1967 13 window bus immediately.

After some restoration work, the bus became my weekend drive and a fun one at that. I participated in several local area drives and VW specific car shows. The local VW enthusiasts were quite interested in the bus, and I was constantly approached to sell it. This was a keeper though until a made a local connection with a 993 for sale.



Although, I was quite satisfied with my collection of VWs and the 912E, there was something lacking. I wanted a more modern 911 with dependability, reliability, and more horsepower. It needed AC and heat and be able to travel cross country at modern speeds and with convenience. I started looking in 2012 at new 911's and over the next 10 years I test drove 996, 997, and 991 generation cars. All very nice and fun to drive.

My gut however kept telling me that I really wanted was a clean air-cooled 964 or 993 ... my roots!

The problem, there are late generation air-cooled 911s out there for sale, but not many available locally or at an affordable price.



I wanted to be able to touch it, sit in it, and feel how it drove before purchasing. I was content that the right one would someday become available locally if I could muster the patience to wait.

One day at a SSPCA drive, I casually mentioned my interest in buying a 993 or 964 to the Andrew but at today's prices I doubted that would ever become a reality. Several months later, Andrew texted me out of the blue one day and asked if I was still interested in a 993 because a fellow Silver Sage member had one for sale. I replied with the obvious "ves" and asked for a connection to the owner.

Andrew forwarded Julio's number and we setup a meeting at a Thursday night Cruise In. When I saw the car, I knew immediately that this was the one! What were the odds; the exact model, color, interior, options, mileage, etc. I had been searching for and LOCAL! This car checked all the boxes. I spent the next couple of days on the internet researching. After a discussion with my wife, I decided to pull the trigger and pursue the 993 with a diligence process. Julio agreed to meet to go over the service records and receipts during his ownership.

A Carfax was ordered, and we agreed to get a Pre-Purchase Inspection. Everything was aligning with my plans except one minor detail, Julio's asking price was beyond my budget. The solution was that I would have to sell one of my other cars. The hot-rodded bug, never! The 912E, maybe, but with all that history, probably not. That left the VW Bus. There were no real emotional ties other that it is cool, had a storied history, and a blast to drive.

I spread the word with the local VW enthusiasts club in hopes of making another local connection. I got a lot of interest and several low-ball offers. Fortunately, one guy I met at a VW show in June was interested in buying the bus. We met and the bus was sold that day following a test drive with his wife and two teenage daughters. I think they had a lot to do with the sale since they absolutely loved it! With the deal done, the bus was gone and the illusive 993 had become a reality.





The sale of these air-cooled 911s, the local connections involved, and the new found friendships are wonderful examples of how PCA brings us together. We are each thrilled with our new cars and appreciative of all involved in finding new forever homes for some fine and much-loved Porsches.



Another year of autocross is in the books. 2022 saw a number of changes to the way we run autocross as we learned from

previous years. We changed the registration process to MotorsportReg, introduced a PAX scoring system with car classifications, and added a live scoring system. (Details on PAX scoring/car classifications can be found on the Silver Sage website.) For the last event we were also able to borrow loaner helmets from the local SCCA group and they did get some use by participants and fun runs at the end of the day.



We started the year with a cold and wet event in April. We did in fact have snow coming down and a lot of wind during the day. The track was both wet and dry throughout

the weekend. That presented drivers with variable conditions which tested everyone's skill levels.

In the July event we went to the other side of the extreme and experienced really hot weather. Fewer cars and perhaps stickier tires but also some tires getting too hot. Tire pressures and cooling mechanisms for those tires were on the minds of drivers. Fewer drivers and so we were able to shorten the day and finish before it got really hot.



The October event balanced the two previous ones with excellent weather and cooler temperatures but not cold like it could have been. This event was well attended and we were able to get some fun runs in as well. The course was similar for all three events and combined all the essential elements of an autocross. Various radius turns, slaloms, lane changes, acceleration and braking zones were all in play. One event used a two lap course with correspondingly longer times. The others used a one lap course with times around 50 seconds.

At the end of each day we awarded \$25 gift certificates to the Porsche Boise parts desk to the low raw time, low PAX time, low PAX 4-door time and event chair best car/driver of the day. As you know Porsche Boise sponsors our autocross events and this helps in keeping the entry costs low for participants. We really appreciate their support in our Driver Education activities.

events and one fall event. Look for registration announcements in the coming months. Our event weekends are April 1-2, May 6-7 and October 21-22. Also, don't forget that these cars are designed to handle this activity. You will certainly learn about your car in different ways (and yourself!) than just driving on the street. It is a safe and fun event for all, including novices.

The Silver Sage Region PCA Autocross season for 2022 came to a roaring close October 15 – 16 at the Expo Idaho parking lot. The sunny, fall conditions were perfect as drivers zigged and zagged around the course, working for improved times. This final event fielded 28 drivers each day, drawing expert, Everyone got 10-12 runs each around a course that focused on learning to look 2 cones ahead. Cones were tagged....our red Cayman S, aka Scarlet, seemed especially frisky hip checking several and even eating a couple! No damage was done of course, just a brief hold removed. Watching Brian's white Cayenne S, aka "the grocery hauler," and hearing Tom's GT3 rip around the course was extraordinary! On Sunday, we had a record number SEVEN female drivers tearing up the course! Smiles were plentiful! The car banter in the pit lane and at the timing tent was lively. Special thank you to Bob and Vicki Pentecost for delivering a tasty lunch each day for all participants. And thank you to Porsche of Boise and Idaho Flooring Supply for their sponsorships. Get ready for the 2023 SSPCA Autocross season! First event is planned for April 2023.



I think we all had a great time at the Kick-Off dinner for Oktoberfast and look forward to making it happen again next year!




WINE TOUR WINE & CHIPS

Linda and I joined PCA in 1989 in response to a promotion for the "Grapes on the Snake" wine and cheese tour and gimmick rally. Since then, we have organized or participated in an embarrassing number of winery tours, including the last several tours during Oktoberfast. When the Pentecosts were unable to organize the wine tour this year, we thought we could easily fill in for them.

We thought we'd try some wineries that hadn't been on previous tours and Linda got busy selecting a couple of wineries outside the Sunnyslope area, Indian Creek and Vizcaya. While she arranged the locations, wine selections and lunches, I planned the route. All the available computer route planners make it easy to take the most direct route to the wineries, but they don't seem to have a preference for the route with the most curves and scenery and the least traffic. After several attempts I had a draft for a tour that wound through the southern part of Ada County and back up to Indian Creek Winery. It included the little "town" of Mora.





If anyone else isn't familiar with Mora, it was a bustling stage stop between Boise and the silver mines in Silver City at the beginning of the twentieth century. Like many small towns across the country, the railroad and automobile caused its demise. The only remnant of the town is the Mora School, which was a storage yard for old cars until it was cleaned up and restored a few years ago. I had been on Kuna-Mora Road many times, but never knew what Mora was until I planned the tour.

A couple of months before Oktoberfast Bob and Vicki Pentecost agreed to help us pre-run the tour on a Saturday morning. We left Porsche of Boise and were about five miles and a few turns south

when Bob radioed to ask if I noticed the stickers marking the centerline. A few miles later we reached the dreaded chipseal. We tried several alternate roads toward the wineries, but each eventually turned to chipseal. We limped along to the wineries and came home without a plan other than to check the Ada County Highway District website for information.

Fortunately, the website had a map of the chipseal status that was regularly updated. I watched it for weeks until almost every road southwest of Boise had been completed.

Sid Cannon agreed to pre-run the route with me on the Thursday before Oktoberfast and lead our second group on the Saturday morning tour. We rode in my 924S, just in case the ACHD map was too optimistic.

We only had to eliminate one short section of my original plan because the chips hadn't been compacted sufficiently. prepared final route directions that evening, and everything seemed ready for a fun tour.

We had 26 cars show up at Porsche Boise for the tour on Saturday divided into two groups. After the mandatory safety meeting we quickly passed through all the traffic and stoplights on Cole Road but were stopped by a flagman on Lake Hazel Road. He told me the road was blocked ahead for road construction (which wasn't noted anywhere on




the ACHD website or on our Thursday pre-run) and he was directing everyone over to Cloverdale. We all pulled over while I floundered through our directions for alternate routes, communicated with the 13 cars in our group and radioed to Sid and Vicki Cannon leading the second group. We turned around and headed south on Cloverdale as directed by the flagman. Cloverdale had been closed on Thursday when Sid and I were testing the route, but I assumed the flagman wouldn't divert us to a road that also was closed. Wrong assumption. We all had to turn around again and take another detour. Eventually we were able to use the second half of our directions and see the "town" of Mora on the backroads to Indian Creek Winery.

Indian Creek was well-prepared for us, perhaps assisted by the 15-minute construction delay, and we enjoyed a wine flight on their shady lawn. Vizcaya is only a few minutes away, where they served us a variety of wines under their outdoor pavilion. Wonderful box lunches were delivered by Open Table Catering and several members accepted the offer to tour the facility after lunch. Everyone enjoyed the wineries and lunch and most said they didn't mind the construction diversions. From Vizcaya we went our separate ways, some toward Sunnyslope and most back to Boise to clean up our cars for the big show at The Village on Saturday.

into the show. Every participant will be receiving a surprise (oops) photo in the mail thanks to Greg Myers and Porsche Boise.




Porsche Boise kept the crowd supplied with hats, shirts, jackets, fee posters and a big video screen that put a buzz in the air.



Gary Roeder was the driving force behind planning and implementation of TRSS event. Gary collaborated with PCA National and the BMW CCA Foundation to make sure the event would be performed without any issues. He worked with the local chapters of the BMW CCA and the SCCA to staff volunteer instructors so that we could host 20 or more teen drivers. 


