

City of Good feeds hungry children while employing workers at Boise restaurants who source fresh and seasonal produce from local food producers.

City of Good Weekend Fuel Kits Program is designed to help Boise School District Community Schools feed food-insecure children every weekend. Partner restaurants are paid to create the meals, helping to ensure that kitchen staff remains employed and economic resiliency exists within their business model. They produce six meals for every kit, and meals are made with no less than 30% of locally sourced ingredients, helping to ensure local farmers, ranchers and bakeries are supported.



One of these coupes was delivered to Carrera Motors of Bend Oregon on August 15, 1994 and became the personal car of the dealership owner.


On June 22, 1996 a convoy of Silver Sagers traveled to Bend to attend a tech session hosted by Carrera Motors (the closest Porsche dealer to Boise).

While looking around the lot, Kitty Fleischman quickly spotted the blue 993.

As the story was later told to me, while husband Gerry was casually strolling the lot, Kitty was inside buying her life-long traveling companion BLU MAX. The name was bestowed by Carrera Motors Salesman Jim Scott in honor of the German WWII flying medal awarded for downing 20 enemy planes. He said the car had languished on the lot because Riviera Blue was not a popular color for a Porsche. According to Kitty, even though the new Porsche monthly payment was more than their house payment, Gerry supported her decision. In the following years, Kitty and BLU MAX became a racing legend with the Northwest Hill Climb Association, Snake River SCCA, three PCA Parade autocrosses and the Silver Sage BBB Hillcross, PCAs only sanctioned hill climb event.

When the time came to hand over the keys to BLU MAX, I was fortunate to be in the right place at the right time.

I purchased this car from someone back in 1988. I was looking for a 1974 Targa. I wanted the newer body style (they added 5 mph bumpers in '74) and didn't want a 75-77 because they instituted smog requirements and those years started having overheating issues....so that's why I wanted a '74.

I met the guy, and it was the car I was looking for, but it had some pretty significant issues: 2nd gear synchro was out, no radio (it had been stolen) and it had, what looked like a \$39 Earl Scheib Special paint job (the hood was chipping pretty badly).

I told the guy that I was interested, but not at his \$9000 asking price. As I handed him a piece of paper with some information on it. I told him that "I'm not trying to insult you or low ball you, but IF you can't sell it at your price, I'd be willing to pay you \$7500 because of all the issues". And I walked away. He thanked me and I am sure he would not ever want to call me.

Well, that did not last long. I got a call the next day. He explained that he was moving to Alaska in a couple of weeks and needed to unload the car fast (I am guessing there was little interest) ... and asked if I would pay \$8500. I apologized and said that I could not and held firm at \$7500.

In the first year of ownership, I knew a guy that was the head body guy at Bowen-Scarff Ford dealership in Kent, WA and asked him if he would/could paint it for me in my 10' high two car garage. He created a paint booth with plastic, removed as many parts as he could (windows, door handles, chrome, etc.) and took the car down to metal, and then built it back up.

He offered to paint it for \$500 for his labor and I pay all the material expenses. SOLD!

35 years later, I still have the car and it still looks spectacular.

I have just taken US delivery of a 2023 911 Turbo S Cab, in PTS Dark Olive Metallic, which as I understand it is very rare.

I first picked up the vehicle in February in Germany, and drove to Spain to drop her off. Not germain to the topic of your article, but perhaps should be the subject of a future one: the European delivery experience was amazing! From the hotel in Leipzig, to the Experience Center campus, to our hosts and the complimentary fine dining breakfast and lunch, we felt welcome and like "VIPs" the whole day. Driving a Turbo S on the track was a blast. Driving across Germany, France, and Spain made for the road trip of a lifetime. Experiencing the Autobahn, traversing famous wine regions, exploring France's countryside, and crossing the Pyrennes created indelible memories.

Unfortunately, I would call the choice of



color a "saga" with ups and downs as opposed to a hagiography. I was second guessing myself for most of the continental trip over the color of the car. Why didn't I choose a more common color? Why did I do paint to sample anyway? Well the answer is that I really enjoyed thinking about and dreaming about the color choice. I ruminated about it for at least 6 months before finalizing the order. I knew I wanted a green, and internally debated British Racing Green, Underberg Green, Porsche Racing Green, Oak Green Metallic, and Dark Olive Metallic.

One of the great benefits of the 2023 Porsche configurator was that for the first time it would depict paint to sample colors on the website. The configurator is obviously designed to present potential cars very accurately. With each little feature selected or deselected the rendering of the car changes. For example, when choosing the heritage interior, a subtle green hue was depicted with the gauges, including the sport chrono gauge on top of the dash. I switched between exterior paint colors many times, and subtle variations were seemingly depicted carefully in each new rendering of the car.

When I unveiled the car in Leipzig, I was initially deflated. Did I order a black car?! Everything else about the car matched or exceeded my expectations wonderfully. The heritage interior was exactly as the configurator predicted. The quality of the materials, the lines, and the sound of the car were gobsmacking. But I kept thinking about the color. It was nowhere close to that depicted on the Porsche configurator (even as it stands to this day). What was curious, however, is that in the My Porsche app, the color is very accurate (looks black)!

Now that the car is in the US (finally!), and in sunny Boise, I have come to appreciate the "multiple personalities" the car exhibits in different lighting and at different angles. Showing her off the other day to some friends on a tree lined street, I happened to stand at the exact right angle and have the perfect lighting to make the paint look as green as can be.

Anyway, hope you have enjoyed my ramblings and I respectfully submit the rare and mystifying: Dark Olive Metallic 911 Turbo S.

The other amazing thing to see was the sheer variety of customizations people had made to their cars. Some had custom interiors, others great wheels, a few had

wild wraps. In a show this size you see a bit of everything. Personally, I have spent more than a few hours of my life using the Porsche Car Configurator. Picking a model, a wheel type, a color, interior colors, interior material.... endless combinations. Walking around Werks is like having that program in front of you. You see all the models, all the colors, all the wheel types, and interior choices in person. Over on the "Judged" side of Werks there was the same sort of variety from a completely worn and tattered 356 that had visible rust to a the newest Taycan and everything in-between. One of those in-betweens was a legendary Porsche 917 that had Derek Bell's name on it, and there stood Derek Bell standing next to it! The judges were extremely interested in the story of the car. Walking around many of the cars had lengthy description of how the current owner had ordered the car and waited 5 years to get it, or restored the car, or the car had been in their family for generations, and it had become woven into to the fabric of their lives. All the winners are shown at this website. Porsche Club of America had a store on site and a membership tent. There were also lots of vendor tents for everything you may want for your car. If you have a chance to go to a Werks Reunion, I strongly suggest you do. You will meet lots of great people, hear lots of great car stories,

There were a number of very pointed questions from our members regarding the long-term effects of these techniques and products on paint and trim. The detailers were able to provide in-depth technical responses as well as their own personal experience in response to these understandable concerns. We have all become focused on trying to bathe our cars with copious lather and torrents of deionized or demineralized water to promote the life of the paint, but there are times and places when the car simply needs a cleaning and barely a bucket of tap water is on hand. In those situations, it pays to know there are safe alternatives for a quick and eye-pleasing clean up.

TECH TALK ADAM'S POLISHES



Silver Sage Porsche Club of American would like to thank Adam, from Adam's Polishes, for the sold-out polishing, paint correction, and ceramic coating demonstration. We would also like to thank John Browning for hosting the event at the most amazing venue that you can imagine, The Glove Box.

When Adam requested to use my 997 Turbo in his demonstration, I was very flattered and excited. Then reality set in that it was like being the fat kid chosen in a dodge ball game. He was looking for a dark car, with lots of flaws, swirls, and in desperate need of paint correction. and a 1 foot by 1 foot spot on my trunk that was super shiny. I learned that everything I have done in the past is incorrect. (Note: if you are interested in a slightly used buffer, then please give me a call). My big take away was that detailing a car is a lot like driving and sex, all guys think they are good at it, but they really are not.

KEITH HAHN

Christian, from Prestige Aircraft and Auto Detailing, came to the rescue and finished the 997 in my garage. His team cleaned (inside and out), detailed, did a two-stage paint correction, and then ceramic coated the car, wheels, and brake calipers.

Some of the points driven home include using the correct buffer. The circular buffers leave marks on the paint that can be seen in the sunshine while use of the Dual Action buffer leaves no marks.

After the 2-hour demonstration I left the demonstration with a lot of information,



Although touted by most auto detailing companies, the inexpensive (cheap) brands of polisher are simply that. Quality products for your quality cars are mandatory to bring out the best in the paint. It is more important to spend your time on one section of the car at a time. As Adam explained, you begin with great intentions and provide 90% of your energy on the first panel. As the time goes by, you get tired of the project and are less meticulous. You can walk around cars and see the results. The first section is stellar while the last section is less than. I will be doing walk arounds with a different mindset at the next Oktoberfast.

This process is not cheap, but it is a great investment, as it not only protects your car, but it takes the paint to a whole new level. I strongly recommend that you suck it up and do it right. I have attached some followup pictures for inspiration. I am really looking forward to the next SSPCA tech session when Adam is going to demonstrate how to professionally clean a car. I am guessing that I have room for improvement in that area as well.

This is what we did - a group of wine enthusiasts embarked on a specialized wine tour to experience some of the finest wineries the Tri-Cities have to offer. With Porsche as our ride, the sunroof open, and wine as our mission, we were ready to indulge in some world-class wine sipping, and we were not disappointed.



Our group embarked on a luxurious journey to wine country in a variety of Porsche's, all made for a trip like this drive, with Bob and Vicki Pentecost in the lead. Through curvy mountain roads, we headed east from Boise to a region of more than 200 wineries, knowing we would only sample a few. We made our way through the scenic mountains, excitement filling the air as we anticipated the delicious wines awaiting us. Our first stop was the breathtaking Canyon Coyote Winery, where we were greeted by knowledgeable staff and lunch on the patio with your choice of red or white wine. But we re-scheduled it for April 8 and had a full house.

works at the dealership. On display were a Macan hooked up to the PIWIS system and a Taycan in partial disassembly so we could observe the frunk area along with the service cabinet of special test equipment needed to work on the HV system. In addition, there was a 964 on the lift that was having an engine out service.





Alan, Avis, Liam, Connor, and John talked through all aspects of the service department from first customer touch through return of the vehicle to the owner. In addition, we had representation from sales with Eddie present in the shop. There were a number of specific questions and topics that were covered in the hour or so that we had access to the service staff. Key takeaways from the discussion were that the staff is well trained by the factory training regimen. Several are high voltage certified as well. The staff can work on any Porsche, and they do. The PIWIS system is essential to diagnosis of any OBD-II car.

Plans were shared for the new dealership building which will be located between the Acura and Jaguar buildings. It will have a dedicated service area for Porsche as well.

Everyone got a mini vintage oil can bank and several raffle prizes were distributed to the lucky winners.

Silver Sage is proud to offer two service projects each year. One, is usually an evening with great

food and auction items that have been donated to raise funds for a nonprofit charity. Our other community project looks a lot like a prison farm work release program.

In earlier years when Silver Sage participated in the Adopt A Highway program, it was an all day excursion. One section was past Lowman, Idaho and the other section was just south of Cascade, Idaho. Now, through the efforts of Walt Thode, Silver Sage has the sweetest 2-mile road section in Idaho. It now usually only takes a commitment of 4 hours. Highway 55 is probably the busiest roadway in the state and through the club's efforts our section is the cleanest. The Adopt A Highway sign designating the Silver Sage Porsche Club as "cleaners" of the 2-mile stretch sits proudly on the top of the hill just north of Horseshoe Bend and ends across the Payette River Bridge. These signs acknowledge our work and provides visibility to others. Actually, a Porsche owning couple, new to Idaho, saw the signs and were excited to not only join the Club but also sign up for the work program. In the past we have had members of a motorcycle club stop and give us a "hand," not clapping, actually grabbing bags, and working a short time.

Who would ever think there would be a waiting list for the opportunity to wear an orange vest and fill an orange bag; while some motorists shout as they drive by:





"ROUGH WINDS DO Shake the darling Buds of May"

- William Spakespeare And we had rough winds in the Porsche market for the month of May. Despite offering the most cars we have seen all year, there were 585 Porsches offered on the various online and legacy auctions throughout the month. However, the lowest sell-through rate year to date was 70% and the second lowest dollar volume was just over \$31 million. But not all markets were shaken by the winds of May as some, like the 356 markets, fared well while others, like the 992 GT market fell apart. The 356 markets remained strong with an 88% sell-through rate off 8 sales with an average price paid of just over \$112,000. Now that might seem low for an average price,

however, it should be noted that the offerings consisted of run-of-the-mill coupes and cabriolets, not a special car in sight. But that is ok considering we did not have any legacy auctions taking place this month. The top 356 for the month was a 1958 356A Cabriolet finished in a lovely shade of Meissen Blue and coming off a recent, extensive restoration.



Had the car had its original engine the price would have been much higher, but this sale for meis an indication of the strength and interest still held for Porsche's original.

Classic 911s (1976 & earlier) on the other hand had a difficult time finding new homes with only 59% of cars on offer selling. No one series of 911 stood out as sales were hit or miss but the top end of the market seemed to suffer the most with two notable no sales; one being a 1967 911 Soft-Window Targa 5-speed that was bid to \$226,000 and the other an original 1970 911 S/T bid to \$385,000. The S/T was a surprise as one would think that with Porsche's imminent announcement of the new 992 911 S/T, at

least a collector or two would want to bag one of the only 33 cars produced to complete the set in their garage.

But it was not just the top end of the classic 911 market that suffered from wind burn either as three cars capable of topping the \$1m sales mark failed to sell leaving a highly optioned Chromaflair 2019 GT2 RS as this month's top sale at \$585,000. The first was a very rare 1996 993 GT2 Clubsport that remained unsold at \$1,605,000 against a probable \$2m reserve price. The other two were models we have seen trade hands earlier this year, a 1988 959 Komfort and a 2005 Carrera GT which failed to sell at \$1,450,000 and \$1,060,000, respectively. At the top end of the modern 911 market, we saw the 997.1 GT3s start to dip a little bit with an average sales price of \$134,000 and two out of the five cars on offer failing to sell. 992 GT3s also continued their slide with new market lows at \$224,000 and \$235,000 and not a single 6-speed GT3 Touring selling for over \$300,000 as that ship has sailed. GT3 RS variants on the other hand climbed with the sale of a 2010 RS at a strong \$242,000 and three 991 GT3 RS' selling for an average price of \$211,000.

Cayman GT4s were a hard sell this month with a 10,000-mile 2016 GT4 selling for below \$100k at \$94,000, which is a trend I would love to see for personal reasons, and a 2020 GT4 selling about \$5,000 light at \$122,000. And then there is the GT4 RS market... Two more cars failed to sell at bids of \$266,000 and \$245,000 proving that huge overs for the GT4 RS are not in the cards as they were for their 911 brethren.

As I stated at the beginning though, it was not all gloom for May. We had a number of record sales such as \$123,000 for a 120,000-mile 1994 911 Coupe finished in Amazon Green Metallic, and \$81,000 for the lowest mileage 2002 996 Carrera 4S we have seen in five years. We also saw a 928S sell for a record price of \$108,000, about 4x the average for these cars, and a "normal" 987 Boxster S achieved \$52,000.

But while May might have been a bit of a disappointment, I am looking forward to June's auctions with the 75th Anniversary Porsche sale hosted by Broad Arrow Auctions at the Porsche Experience Center in Atlanta and the sale of the Gruppe P Collection on Bring a Trailer that includes a 1967 Porsche 910. Will we finally see an important Porsche race car sold next month?

Bob Rathbone was King of the Hill in his 2007 911 GT3 with a time of 1:57.063, barely beating out Todd Schimmels in his 1976 930 and Hal McMillan in his 2007 Cayman S. Queen of the Hill was Laurie Landers in her 1986 944 Turbo with a time of 2:19.274. (It's too bad we don't get to experience the BBB Hillcross anymore.)
