




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THE SAGE TICK - SILVER SAGE PCA

History of saturday morning "coffee & cars" drives



40 cars taking part. When numbers were high. the cars were typically divided into two groups, one leaving 10-15 minutes before the other. Infrequently, one group would run the route normally and the other would start at the end and go "backward," with a meeting scheduled in the middle.

WALT THODE The Saturday morning Silver Sage Porsche Club drives, known variously as Coffee & Cars, Caffee und Autos, Coffee & Porsches, and maybe some others, began in the spring of 2012 when Rex Chandler, our president at the time, organized the first one in conjunction with Porsche Boise. These events were designed to take just a few hours, starting around 8:30 on the first Saturday of the month in good weather months, and would be completed by noon to allow members' other weekend activities to take place. They begin at the Porsche Boise showroom with coffee, fruit, and various pastries available, and the dealership has been steadfast in continuing to support these drives throughout the twelve years of their existence.

Rex, along with Laura Landers, led the first of these drives on May 5, 2012. They continued throughout the year, with the last one occurring on November 2. In succeeding years, the drives typically began in April and ended in October. In 2013 and 2014, the drives were headed up by Dave Keim and Larry Walter. In 2015, Dave teamed up with Jim Parkinson to continue leading the drives. The number of cars grew from the high teens to sometimes over




It was maybe late 2016 when the drives were sometimes organized and led by Denis and Patricia Dunlop. Denis eventually took over as the organizer of these drives, aided by Patricia. Andrew King sometimes assisted in them as well. Also, sometime during the late teen years, the last drive of each year became part of the club's Oktoberfast weekend, and the trip included stops at nearby wineries; these were usually led by Vicki Pentecost or Linda Prusynski.

As Cayenne SUVs became more popular in the club, an occasional drive featured them, along with Macans and some non-Porsche interlopers. These drives, involving off-road excursions,

were referred to as Coffee and Dirt, and became an infrequent component of the Saturday morning events. These were headed up variously by Paul Kaczmarek, Ken Robinson, and maybe others.

During the COVID period, all of these drives were curtailed, but resumed after the pandemic eased and vaccines became available. In 2023, after years of service, Denis turned over the organization of these drives to Doug Ooley, who continues in that role to the present.

It should be said that the history of these drives is difficult to track, because few articles in the Sage Tick featured them, even though they occur at least six times a year.

Many regions are not as fortunate as Silver Sage Region to have a local Porsche dealership active with the



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


2025 Treffen at Sea fun as told by attending members of Silver Sage

Recently my wife Lindsey and I had the pleasure of taking a cruise up to Alaska with 902 PCA friends. It was incredible to be on a huge ship with so many Porsche minded people. It was easy to strike up conversation wherever we went. There was always something going on from seminars to art activities. Vicki Pentecost and Lindsey decorated white chocolate Porsches! It was delicious. We saw lots of amazing things, but the highlight for me personally was a float plane trip out of Juneau, Alaska. We booked the excursion with Princess Cruises.





The dock where the Seaplanes were located was just off the bow of the cruise ship. We simply walked off the ship, walked down the dock, got on the De Havilland Otter float plane, and took off to fly over five glaciers. The trip included a fantastic lunch stop at the historic Taku River Lodge overlooking the base of a glacier called Hole in the Wall. On the return trip we flew over a couple more glaciers and landed back at the dock.

Unlike most others, I won't be talking about any of the excursions people made as part of the Treffen At Sea experience, since Mary and I didn't do any of them. This will be solely about the boat trip itself and the towns we visited.

I'd never been on a big ship cruise before, but we decided to go because I've always wanted to do an Alaska cruise, and because we wanted to join the other Silver Sagers who were going, along with nearly 900 other PCA members. I had trepidations about a ship that held up to 4,500 people. We've done a river cruise on a 140-passenger boat, which we loved, but the size of the Majestic Princess, plus the danger of such things as COVID in such a contained space with a large crowd, worried me, but we signed up. The sheer size of the boat, which had 20 numbered decks, was amazing. Think of a 20-story hotel moving from place to place. Apparently with a ship that size, seasickness seemed to be a non-issue.



The boat had anything you can think of onboard. and multiple activities every hour of the day. I pretty much limited my activities to those associated with the Treffen At Sea; various presentations by PCA and associated sponsors.

Weather was probably typical for that part of Alaska, generally high 50s, although temperatures reportedly reached the mid-70s the day after we headed south. The ship stopped at three Alaska ports, Kechikan, Juneau, and Skagway, plus a perfunctory stop in VIctoria, B.C. It turns out that some obscure U.S. statute requires some ships leaving a U.S. port to stop at least once in a foreign port before returning. The Alaska stops were all interesting; small towns that seemed to be able to manage half a dozen big cruise ships at a time. Skagway, especially, seemed to exist solely for the tourist trade. I learned that Juneau is the only state capital that you can't drive to; all traffic is by air or sea. I walked to the state capitol building and was disappointed to find that it doesn't have a dome like every other one I've seen. I read that after we left, some part of a nearby glacier melted and released water that caused parts of Juneau to flood.

The ship itself I found confusing. Most of the time I wanted to go somewhere aft, I ended up going forward, and vice versa. I decided that the staircases, which were all half facing each way with a landing in the middle, was part of the issue for me. The numerous elevators should have helped, but I often stepped off them only to go the wrong direction. The accommodations and facilities were all excellent -- big theater and performance spaces, all well-equipped and comfortable. The food was of two types: the large 16th-deck cafeteria space with anything you could imagine for every meal, and the specialized (read "extra cost") restaurants with very good food. The bars were good, too.

If you haven't done a cruise like this, it's worth it to do one. Next year's Treffen At Sea will go to New England and Eastern Canada. I'm glad I did this one, but I don't expect to do any more.




exciting when a moose was spotted on the side of the road after our driver had just been telling us a moose story. He said when he started driving, there





a thunderous curtain of water – as tall as a 10-story building – pours over remnants of an ancient volcanic super-eruption. A mile south, Lower Mesa Falls repeats the performance, the river continually chiseling away at the solidified ash and lava. The beautiful Upper and Lower Mesa Falls are the last prominent waterfalls on the Snake River unaffected by manmade influences. A scenic walking path leads to excellent viewpoints.

The area around the falls is perfect Service Berry territory, also called wild blueberries (but only by us) and a Thimble berry or two was to be had. Military services remind members never pass up an opportunity to eat, sleep or ... so munch on we did. After lunch and more perfect Porsche roads we headed into Montana to visit the Earthquake Lake Visitor Center in West Yellowstone, Montana. On August 17, 1959, an earthquake sent millions of tons of rock, dirt and trees at speeds over 100 MPH into the Madison River. The loss of life and destruction was significant and the resulting dam caused by the collapse of the canyon walls created 'earthquake lake'. This creation merited immediate response as any buildup of water would eventually break thru and destroy many miles of towns and farms

below. Government contractors set to work clearing debris and cutting a channel allowing the forming lake an outlet downstream averting the pending disaster. Though this earthquake happened 65 years ago the sides of the canyon wall still look raw as if it happened yesterday and snags still dot the sides of the lake. 




HOT CARS & COFFEE FALCON Car Show & Grand Opening




