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
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If you squint just right, it almost looks like Le Mans—but make it local, and add a healthy dose of tire squeal, orange cones, and wide grins. This, friends, is Brezelcross—Silver Sage's very own flavor of autocross madness. And the first event of the season didn't disappoint.



HELD IN THE SUN-DRENCHED CONFINES OF OUR USUAL TARMAC BATTLEGROUND, THE APRIL BREZELCROSS HAD IT ALL:

GT cars on a warpath, vintage 911s slicing corners like they've got something to prove, and a beautifully chaotic mix of Boxsters, Caymans, and more recent 992s getting properly sideways in the name of science (and seat time).

For those unfamiliar, Brezelcross is not some overly serious, stopwatch-obsessed proving ground. It's where enthusiasts of every level—from the wide-eyed first timer to the seasoned corner apex whisperer—come to fling their cars around in a controlled chaos of tire grip and throttle finesse. 

Our Past President, Vicki Pentecost, had our new members introduce themselves. I didn't count, but it seemed like at least six couples told us a little bit about themselves and their wide variety of Porsches, including one being converted to an electric vehicle after its gasoline engine burned up.

Vicki also summarized our upcoming events, and Gary Roeder discussed the Driver Skills Car Control Clinic and autocross.

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SIX TREASURE VALLEY LOCATIONS!







The day started with all the drivers meeting at Eagle Coffee and Bakery just off Highway 55. I changed the meeting location so we could get quickly on the road and have the best chance of all members in the group being able to stay together and not have to meander through in-town traffic. The traffic gods were in our favor today, as we were able to line up



multiple times and enjoy the drive as one. I led the first of three groups consisting of nine cars each. We hopped on the 55 and headed up toward Donnelly.

The drive began over the rolling green hills as

we left the Treasure Valley. Having the drive in late May allowed us all to enjoy the new summer weather, as temperatures reached the mid-70s. We also avoided having to deal with snow on the roads and could really let our tires grip the pavement. Before long, we were amongst the evergreen trees in the mountains. Sheer cliffs flanked our side as we followed the Payette River up toward Cascade.

This stretch of the trip was very enjoyable.

The mountainside gave us twists and turns, perfect maneuvering for Porsche's tight handling abilities.

We really are lucky to live so close to such a variety of what Mother Nature has to offer.

Before long, the trees opened up to the stunning view of the Cascade Valley. Green meadows surrounded us, sharing their springtime blooming flowers. If anyone ever doubts Idaho's beauty, send them to Cascade in May. Absolutely breathtaking. Even my wife, Mercedes,




We got to chat, enjoy each other's company, and deepen friendships found in the club.

One of those rare mornings where everything aligns—the sunrise glowing over a clean dash, the hum of anticipation in your chest, and just the right balance of nerves, throttle, and caffeine.

After a quick gas top-off (I feed Frogger premium like it's a love language) and a pit stop to say hey to my kiddo slinging espresso at a local coffee shop, I pointed the nose of my 1982 911SC Targa toward Porsche Boise.

I arrived early—because of course I did—grabbed a donut (priorities), and started soaking in the scene. Cars were trickling in like an exotic migration, each one flexing in its own way. Every model had a proud human nearby,



eyeing it like it was the last chocolate croissant at a French bakery.

With SSPCA's own Doug Ooley as our ringmaster, things had that "okay, now it's getting real" vibe. We gathered for a quick safety briefing—sign the waiver, keep it classy, no Fast & Furious nonsense—then split into two groups, each with a lead car and a chaser. Headlights on, coffee topped off, stomachs loaded with sugar... it was time to drive.

The convoy snaked its way through Boise, complete with stoplight flexing and a few non-Porsche drivers wondering if they'd stumbled into a luxury car commercial. And then we hit open road. The green hills past Avimor lit up in the morning sun, and that first real breath of freedom rolled through the pack.

We pulled into the Chevron in Horseshoe Bend for pit stops, coffee refills, and the general chaos of happy people trying to remember if they locked their frunks. The vibe? Pure joy. People of all ages stepped out of their cars with grins like kids who just discovered the cookie jar.

Aviators. Driving shoes. Event jackets from decades past. We looked like a casting call for Ocean's Eleven: Rennsport Edition.

From there, we hugged the river heading toward Garden Valley. Clear blue skies, light traffic, and a soundtrack of flat-sixes and turbos echoing through the canyons. Somewhere mid-pack, I was wearing my signature ear-to-ear grin and trying to keep pace with the newer machines. Suddenly—elk! A full herd, just grazing off in the distance like they'd been hired for scenic ambiance.

Then came the part where everything just clicked. As we left Garden Valley, the group bunched up again and we started to really move. My old aircooled 911 may have been

outgunned in horsepower, but this was my happy place and I wasn't about to get left behind. Hairpins, sweepers, and a willing suspension—the car came alive. It's not just about horsepower; it's about rhythm. Steering inputs, heel-toe shifts, throttle feathering... you know, the dance.

The line of cars stretched and curled like a snake with somewhere to be. Snowcapped peaks loomed in the distance. The air was crisp, the road grippy, and the corners? Chef's kiss. For those unfamiliar, the route to Lowman and over Mores Creek Summit is basically the Nürburgring's weird Idaho cousin—tight hairpins, fast sweepers, elevation changes. It's as if the road was daring us to remember why we love driving.

We pushed—safely and responsibly, obviously—through switchbacks and canyon stretches, our group flowing like a living organism. In no time we were climbing toward Mores Creek Summit, engines singing, tires dancing, and laughter echoing in the exhaust notes. It was joyful chaos, the kind that fills your whole body and makes you want to do it all again immediately.

By midday, we rolled into Idaho City to wrap things up. Thirty-ish cars. Zero drama. Maximum smiles. A few folks grabbed snacks, others gave waves and peeled off down the final stretch. But all of us? Still buzzing.



This wasn't just a drive—it was a reminder. A reminder that while the cars are amazing, it's the people who make it memorable. Everyone I spoke to had a story—how they found their Porsche, why they love driving, what brings them back again and again. The personalities behind the wheel are what give this community its soul.

I may have shown up a Coffee and Porsches rookie, but I left feeling like I'd found my people.






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BITTERSWEET:

THE QUIET FORCE BEHIND THE WHEEL

Julie Bell doesn't make a lot of noise when she rolls into a meet. She doesn't need to. Her 911 4S says plenty—clean, white, purposeful—and the "btrsweet" plate adds just enough mystery to make you wonder: What's the story here?

The story, as it turns out, is one of heart, history, and horsepower.

Julie grew up in a car-loving family. Her dad grew up building hot rods, her sister still has a passion for cars and hot rods to this day, and her brother, Jeff, sketched extremely detailed pictures of cars freehand and owned a silver '67 Targa

he absolutely adored. He even designed one of the Oktoberfast posters in 2013. It's still hanging proudly on Julie's wall. One of her earliest car memories? Hanging out the window of a bright orange K5 Blazer with her brother, both of them wearing an ear to ear grin. And the soundtrack of Julie's youth? How about drag races at Firebird, NASCAR engines in the Midwest, and the quiet thrill of watching a neighbor's 911 glide up the street like something out of a dream.

Her first car? A Chevy Monza Spyder with louvers and just enough attitude to get into trouble. From there, life happened. Career, family, Audis, VWs. The Porsche dream took a back seat—until one day, it became a reality. With her son getting close to heading off to college and the means to finally make the leap, Julie test-drove a Macan and instantly fell in love. And that was just the beginning.



Eventually, she realized her dream and bought a 911.

It wasn't about making a statement. It was about honoring a bond. Her brother passed shortly before she got the car, but not before celebrating her Macan like it was his own. They took drives. Grabbed coffee. Talked cars.

Talked life. But when she

finally sat behind the wheel of her dream 911, he wasn't there to ride shotgun. Or so she thought. She quickly realized he was there with her, and alway would be. That's what her license plate means: bittersweet.



Julie is the kind of person who notices the details—the way a car sounds at startup, how it hugs a turn, the right song for the right road. She brings that same attention to everything she touches, whether it's her role negotiating contracts in healthcare, managing the Silver Sage Instagram page, or writing thoughtful, soul-forward pieces for the Sage Tick. She's not just a gearhead—she's a creative, a poet, and a connector of people.

Ask her what her 911 means to her, and she won't rattle off specs or lap times. She'll tell you how it makes her feel—joyful, grounded, connected. "Every time I start it," she says, "I feel instantly happy. And I think of my brother."



She's not chasing likes or building a brand. She's building memories. And when she talks about her dream of one day driving through Japan with her son—or their upcoming trip to Spain this summer to catch an F1 race in Barcelona, followed by a pilgrimage to the Porsche Museum

in Stuttgart—or enthusiastically cruising Boise backroads in the 911 with her mom and dad—you get the sense that Julie's story isn't just about the car. It's about passion. It's about arrival. It's about living the dream in a way that feels personal, authentic, and earned.

When I asked her at the conclusion of our discussion what 3 words her brother would use to describe her, it led to a touching moment of silence.



"Independent. Fun. Kind."

Sounds about right.

And if you ask around the club, I bet they'll tell you the same.







Our club's Driver's Education program took another big step on May 31st by holding a oneday Driver Skills Clinic at the Expo. The day began bright and early as 23 novice drivers joined a team of 20 PCA and Snake River SCCA volunteers and instructors. The drivers paired off with their instructors to tech their cars for what would be a very hot day learning performance driving skills.









Drivers split into three groups and dispersed to the morning exercises. The combined max braking / accident avoidance and J-turn (brake while turning) exercises introduced

maximum braking in both straight-line and turning scenarios. The wet skid pad allowed drivers to experience understeer, oversteer, and even a few spins—earning more than a few cheers!

After a filling lunch delivered by Bob and Vicki Pentecost, no naps were allowed—only more laps! The afternoon exercises challenged drivers to apply their morning skills in two maneuvering scenarios. The slalom introduced control during hard lateral weight transfer as drivers weaved through the cones.

The Figure 8 taught the difference between increasing and decreasing radius corners, and the all-important skill of looking ahead and through the corners. The afternoon skid pad focused on learning throttle steering.

Feedback throughout the day came in the form of enthusiastic grins and thumbs-up from both instructors and drivers. One instructor commented that he lives for this sort of thing—helping drivers explore and enjoy the ultimate performance of their cars.




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WE DO ALL THE WORK!

MASTERING THE CRAFT:

Mike Bell's

JOURNEY FROM SURF TO STEEL

There's something about the Porsche brand that attracts a certain kind of person—someone driven, curious, and a little obsessive in the best possible way. For Mike Bell, Certified Gold Master Technician at Porsche of Boise, that passion didn't begin with a lifelong dream. In fact, it started with a salmon egg, a surfboard injury, and a beat-up Volkswagen bus.

Growing up in Southern California, Mike was surrounded by mechanics. His dad, uncles, and grandfather all turned wrenches for GM, but young Mike had no interest in the family trade. He worked at Albertson's and nearly became a butcher, until fate (and a Goodyear tire store) pulled him into the world of cars.

One good mentor led to another, and by the time he found himself working at a Newport Beach dealership that housed Chevy, Porsche, Audi, Rolls, and Bentley under one roof, the course of his life was changing fast.

It was there, standing between Corvettes and Carreras, that Mike got his first taste of the Porsche mystique. A quick ride-along in a 993 Turbo lit the spark. "We pulled out on the PCH and punched it," he recalled. "The hair stood up on my arms and that was it. I was hooked."



What followed was a relentless pursuit of mastery. He begged his service manager to give him a shot on the Porsche side. When he finally got it, two Porsche techs took him under their wing—guys who had cut their teeth at Andial and and on teams with legends like the Unser and Haywood. They didn't just show him how to turn bolts; they showed him what it meant to take pride in every detail.

That ethic has never left him.

Today, Mike leads by example at Porsche of Boise. He's meticulous, passionate, and surprisingly humble for someone with a hundred grand worth of tools and two Porsche ride-alongs that topped 200 mph.



He's the guy who shows up early, stays late, and still finds time to chase steelhead with a fly rod in the fall or carve 46 mph lines on a snowboard in winter.

Ask him what job he dreads the most?

"Programming," he says with a groan. "I hate being held captive by the computer." Ask him what he loves? "Engine work—especially air-cooled stuff. It's intense, but rewarding."

And what really sets him apart isn't just the certifications or the decades of experience—it's that he genuinely cares. From cleaning door seals to stamping service books to placing oil caps and engine belts with logos perfectly upright, Mike knows that for most Porsche owners, this isn't just a car. It's a dream realized. "A lot of people save their whole life to get a Porsche," he says. "They deserve to have it treated that way."



younger techs, Mike has never forgotten the value of hard-earned knowledge. His advice to the next generation is simple: "Learn the hard stuff when your paycheck doesn't depend on it. That way, when it does, you can do it right without shortcuts."



Mike's commitment helped shift the perception of Porsche Boise within the local club. Back in 2008, he and his service manager made it their mission to earn the trust of the Silver Sage PCA region, which had long favored local independents. "We wanted to be the kind of shop where people felt comfortable and respected," he says. And they've done just that. From his early days working alignments in Huntington Beach to his current role mentoring

What's next for Mike? Maybe Service Manager. Maybe more time on the river. Either way, you get the sense he's right where he belongs—quietly mastering his craft, one bolt at a time.

And if you happen to catch him in a moment where he isn't smiling away, deep in an engine rebuild, don't

be surprised if he hands you a business card with a thank-you note on it and offers up a friendly handshake. It's just who he is.

"As soon as I came home from the Navy, Rose and I and the children began to drive down to Sebring and went to the 12-Hour race there, which was always interesting," Carter told imsa. com. He could even tell the sports cars by their engine sounds alone.

"They used to sell 33-rpm records of the different sounds of every race care at Sebring, and my wife and I used to listen to them, and we would try to look the other way and see which kind of car was coming."

He got pretty good at it, too.

"Some of the Maseratis and others had

eight-cylinders. Some of them had 12 cylinders, the Ferraris, I believe, had 12 cylinders. They sounded like a sewing machine, very smooth." But when he picked a favorite, Carter went domestic.

"I really kind of fell in love with the Chevrolet Corvette. Corvettes kind of sounded like a John Deere tractor compared to them, but they would hold their own in speed.


